Before you start

This could be assigned as an extension of either “Exploring Our Images of Self,” “Identifying Examples of the Social-Emotional Development Foundations in Picture Books and Family Stories,” or as an independent activity.

Deepening understanding

Review with students some of the activities they have done in this instructional guide that have addressed the influence of culture on social-emotional development. Then, ask them to list some important ways in which cultural communities influence the development of social-emotional competence in young children.

Ask students to find research studies that explore the relationship of culture to social-emotional development

Some specific questions such as the following might be generated in class to guide these explorations:

- What are the social expectations for young children?

A possible exploration might have to do with how children are expected to behave in their interactions with adults.

- What cultural values are expressed in these expectations?

A possible exploration might relate to a cultural value about the community being more important than the individual.
